

Dear Member of Parliament,

Thank you for your service and for the work you do on behalf of Canadians.

I am writing regarding Bill C-9. Like many Canadians, I remain deeply concerned about the bill in its current form and respectfully ask that Parliament (given that it is coming back to the House) fix it before it is sent for Royal Assent.

Many of us understand that political pressures from the Bloc influenced how this amendment came forward.

However, now that the government holds a majority, there is no need to move forward with legislation that has generated such widespread concern among faith communities across Canada. This bill **goes too far**.

I know that hundreds of thousands of Canadians have called, written, signed declarations, and sent letters regarding this issue. Beyond those numbers are many more Canadians who share these concerns but have not participated directly.

My vote in the next election will be influenced by how elected officials respond to this matter. My family, my community, and many others are paying close attention.

Please take this opportunity to restore confidence in our democratic institutions by demonstrating that Canadians have been heard.
